



## Reproductive health data for Arkansas

Arkansas was ranked 49 out of 51 states and the District of Columbia on 2010 preliminary teen birth rates among females aged 15-19 (with 1 representing the lowest rate and 51 representing the highest rate).<sup>RH1</sup> On a similar scale – where 1 is the lowest teen *pregnancy* rate and 51 is the highest – Arkansas was ranked 43 out of 51 states and the District of Columbia in pregnancies to females aged 15- 19 in 2005.<sup>RH2</sup>

Preliminary birth data for 2010, by state, are limited to the first three totals shown below.
